Pom & Olive is located at 1400 Bristol Street, Building C in Costa Mesa. (See map below)



Fly Fishing as a Platform for Change By

Beckie Clarke







Every piece of water we fish, even our most familiar home waters, changes us a little. Often our expectations don't match reality, or our memories play tricks on us. Some new destinations become favorite places to return to while others fall into the "never again" file. For our November presenter, Beckie Clarke, these destinations have molded her outlook on life. Beckie's program will take us on a voyage of discovery to the countries that have shaped her career and brought her to the present day.

In her words: "Everyone is fishing for something, and my program shares all aspects of what life as a gypsy angler looks like in different seasons and how we can flow with it all and use it as a platform for something bigger than ourselves."

While there will be enough detail to satisfy the "techie anglers", the bigger picture promises to be so much more than dry discussions of technique. Beckie will introduce the tips and concepts that have helped introduce young people into our sport.

Beckie was born and raised in British Columbia, Canada. Fly fishing runs deep in her roots and her childhood was spent fishing the rivers, lakes, and coastal waters of BC with her dad and 2 older brothers.

A career in the outdoors was inevitable and she laid her education and career path to be the foundation for her dreams. She studied Adventure Tourism Business Management at College of the Rockies and then headed north to the steelhead rich waters of Smithers, BC where she continued her education at Northwest Community College immersing in Wilderness Guiding Training with a major in Fly Fishing. The dry fly fishery of Fernie, BC captured her heart and for 17 years she was integrated in the Elk Valley fly fishing industry. Working for local fly shops and guiding for several years before starting 2 of her own

companies at once. A flyfishing operation and a property management company alongside each other which allowed her to fish in the summer and ski powder in the winter. A true entrepreneur Beckie put everything she had into her own companies. She taught fly fishing, fly tying and entomology classes at the College of the Rockies, started a local woman's flyfishing club, taught kids to fly fish and would donate her time raising money for local charities.

After hosting saltwater trips to the Bahamas, Beckie was looking for a new destination and discovered Fly Fish Guanaja; a saltwater flyfishing lodge in Guanaja, Honduras. The owner Steve Brown, a Colorado fly fishing guide and her ended up falling in love and joined forces. They host international flyfishing trips, both run Fly Fish Guanaja and their non-profit organization Fish For Change. After their 3rd baby, Beckie sold Fernie Fly Fishing and now focuses on Fly Fish Guanaja and Fish For Change while residing in Colorado. A journey through fly fishing in many seasons of life, Beckie is excited to share how she has shifted to using fly fishing as a platform for change.



Our 7 Week Travel Trailer Fishing Adventure

We just completed a seven week, 4,000+ mile, fly fishing trip through six western states. Our first stop was in Redding, CA to float the lower Sacramento River. We met up with Jim and Cheryl Moore on their annual travels to the Metolius in Central Oregon. We fished out of The Fly Shop with the Kennedy Brothers. The Lower Sac is a great fishery; and we caught some beautiful, healthy, fat rainbow trout. The salmon were beginning to show on the Lower Sac with the steelhead following; eager to eat an egg from the salmon. We landed a total of four steelhead, our first ever!

From there, we fished the Yuba River outside of Oroville with Brian Clemens of NOR CAL Fly Guides; a 2021 FFCOC auction purchase. The Yuba River was a difficult fishery, with crystal clear water and finicky trout, but we managed to land our fair share. We had a great float and ate wild grapes straight off the vine along the river's edge. Due to weather (thunder and lightning) we were unable to fish the Feather River, so we will be back.

From California we drove to Bend/Sisters in Oregon where we fished two days with Mary Ann Dozer of Fly Fishing Pursuits – the first day wading on the Fall River, where my 'Gwendolyn gnat' was the go to fly of the day, and the second day floating on the Deschutes – both great times and wonderful fishing. Great fishing both days using dries and tight line nymphing.

From Oregon we went to the Yakima River in central Washington and floated the Yakima River for two days, another great fishery to visit. We landed some more great rainbows! We fished out of Red's Fly Shop. We have yet to see a brown trout on our travels!

From Washington we drove to Missoula MT, where we fished with the Montana Trout Outfitters. Tony Reinhart, the owner, was a FFCOC speaker. We fished the Clark Fork River — a beautiful float and lots of heathy fish, too. We also fished the Bitterroot River which tested our casting abilities. The fish are easily spooked due to the water clarity and low flows, so most of the fishing was sitting down during the drift; however, we did get quite a bit of dry fly fishing in on the Bitterroot — finally all that casting practice paid off with being able to land that dry fly right smack dab in front of the fish for the take!

We then fished in Yellowstone National Park – the Firehole River, the Gibbon River, and the Madison River (both inside and outside the Park). We fished out of Blue Ribbon Flies; Patrick Daigle was our guide. Patrick is not only a great guide, but also a great photographer. You'll see many of his photos in the weekly Blue Ribbon Flies newsletter. It was exciting to finally get our first opportunity to fish within the park, besides the trout we caught, and we saw quite a few bison roaming along the road. No moose sightings this time. I (Janna) caught my fish of a lifetime, a big brown, on the Madison outside the park in an undercut bank, shin deep in water!

Then we were off to Idaho, and where we fished the Henry's Fork for two days – an interesting fishery filled with plenty of white fish and trout. Our outfitter was the Trout Hunter. Karlie Roland had come to speak to our Club last December. Again, many quality rainbows were landed in our two days of floating. Another great stop!!

After a layover in Utah to visit family, we continued on to Pyramid Lake outside of Reno, Nevada. We fished with Joe Contaldi of Pyramid Lake Anglers, who not only provides the plush shore ladders with cushion seats, but also served a delicious hot breakfast and lunch. Joe's bacon would rival a 5-star Michelin chef! We were too early in the season for shore fishing, it was hit or miss when we made the reservations (the lake was still in transition when we arrived and the fish were still deep), so the second day we fished from a boat with Glenn Lemon, another guide from Pyramid Lake Fishing Guides. Out on the boat, we made up for our lack luster day before with a number of quality fish landed (about the same number were lost). We enjoyed both the experience of shore and boat fishing without the "famous" Pyramid Lake weather; it was mid 70's with blue skies and NO WIND.

All and all a great seven week fly fishing trip. We are already making plans to go out again next fall.



Double Haulin' at the Double Haul Ball - John Van Derhoof

Master Certified Casting Instructor John Van Derhoof will walk folks through the "Hows and Whys" of the Double Haul. Considered a rite of passage by most fly anglers, learning the Double Haul can be an important addition to an individual's ability to fish especially while casting heavier rods/lines, fishing requiring long casts and in adverse conditions. John will talk about shooting line, the Single and Double Haul, the correct timing of the cast and how to teach oneself how to perform it.

On the East Walker River a few days back, fishing with a bunch of longtime and new TU friends, I waited as a downstream drift effortlessly moved my tippet toward me, big Caddis on top, zebra midge below. Moving water takes on its own life when you wait. Cast. Wait. Cast. Wait, attention so focused, an electric spark of attentiveness.

Three days of fishing had yielded only meager results: Day One, skunk; Day Two, two brownies so small they both went through the holes in my net; now the last day was upon us. Late morning on one of the Virginia Lakes yielded spectacular scenes of granite majesty, made us think about geologic time, not human digital.

A lone cutty with beautiful red cheeks held so close to that lake bank, I grabbed my cell to take a shot, then, wondering what I was doing, raced to get my rod, cast the fly back in the water. No dice. The whole morning was like that, cruising fish, with no takers. My fishing bud, Rick, got so frustrated he slapped his rod tip in the water at a cruising fish, who didn't even acknowledge the impact, so he tried again on trout's next pass with the same result. He'd caught four-pounders at this very spot. He was generous enough to share it with me.

Late afternoon brought me back to the West Walker, as low, hot sun baked me to sweat and glare made me double blink. Enchanted by the music of singing water, no waders, yet I couldn't help but submerge my boots on slippery rocks, just to satisfy that trout fever.

Don't slip; set each foot down like balancing on a bowling ball; watch the bank-side scrub brush try to grab that airborne fly for its own.

The guy in the town fly shop told us the "football trout," rainbows who gorge themselves on plentiful bugs below the dam and into the Miracle Mile, were all gone. Too hot. He, himself, also thought about becoming a goner and moving out to North Dakota, tired of fire and endless drought.

In a watery burst, what draws so many of us to fishing happened to me: a flash of majesty and a solid hungry grab. A 12-

inch or so football-shaped trout gleamed silver in that brutally reflective water, hooked and reluctantly riding the current toward me.

"Net!" I pleaded to another fishing bud, Bob, as I guided the trout in current to the bank. Bob was right there and then — just like that — the rainbow fatty was off my barbless hook and swimming freely away.

Over in a minute, what had consumed three days of my life, just like that.

Relief.

No matter what, the skunk needs to go.

Fly fishing is certainly about catching trout, but maybe more about renewal, is it not? It's about connecting with nature in a special way, a hunting way, a caring way that yanks us from our cocooned lives and into the present moment, maybe, into that geologic time where we can see more clearly that we are small, but our impact on nature is increasingly outsized, like that caldera spewing lava some 700,000 years ago, altogether changing the landscape that was.

As a mostly solo fly fisher, usually that burst of calm knowing called renewal comes from water, fish, weather, skill, lack of skill, patience, flashes of angry frustration and a rhythm removed from my urban life. My spiritual battery turns out to be blessedly rechargeable.

Yet on this trip, renewal came from group experience, new and old friends. Collectively, we laughed, got bored, got pissed, got frustrated, learned new things, forgot the old. We hiked in, we ate out, we wondered where in the hell the trout were, caught them on occasion, and tipped our hats to their elusive, wily nature. Everything, just right. We marveled together at the majesty of the Sierra, but I think secretly we marveled at how wonderful it is to be human in a time when honesty, generosity and compassion illuminate our best outcome, our path forward through the dark.

Flies That Keep On Giving!

M&M Leech

Since we have now gotten into still water (float tube) fly fishing, I thought it would be good to tie some still water flies. This particular fly, the M&M Leech is a pattern of Phil Rowley. Hopefully, the trout will like it as much as I liked tying it. This one worked good for us on Gull Lake (June Lake Loop).



Material:

Hook: TMC 2487 #12 Thread: Uni 6/0 Tan Tail: Black Marabou

Body: Flashabou Magnum 1/32" clear

Rib: Krystal Flash – Red Hackle: Black Ostrich Herl Bead: 3/32 Tungsten Gold

Flies That Keep On Giving!

Instructions:

- 1. Lay down a thread base over the hook shank to about the bend of the hook.
- 2. For the tail, preen a 'bunch' of feathers from a marabou feather, and then strip off, trim the butt ends. Tail should be approximately as long as the hook shank, starting at the bead tie the tail on the hook shank and then spiral the thread to the mid-point of the hook shank.
- 3. Tie in a single stand of Krystal flash (red) on the middle of the hook shank with one end of the flash pointing to the tail and the other end pointing to the bead. Once secure then wrap the one end of the Krystal flash (red) back so now both ends of the flash are on either side of the tail. Tie in. Trim the Krystal flash (red) to match the length of the tail.
- 4. Tie in another length of Krystal flash (red) along the side of the hook shank. Make a nice smooth foundation forward to the bead and then move the thread to the back of the fly.
- 5. Tie in the Flashabou Magnum 1/32" (clear) at the tail, then move the thread forward to the bead.
- 6. Wrap the Flashabou Magnum 1/32" (clear) in overlapping wraps over the thread body, completely covering the thread, towards the bead and tie off. Trim excess.
- 7. Strip on herl from an ostrich feather, trimming the butt end. Tie in the ostrich herl right behind the bead. Palmer it (open wraps) from the bead back toward the tail. Make sure there is space between the wraps so the Flashabou Magnum 1/32" (clear) is visible.
- 8. Use the Krystal Flash (red) to tie off the ostrich herl at the tail (but don't trim the excess ostrich herl just yet!) and then rap the Krystal Flash (red) forward as a rib (open spiral wraps) up to the bead and tie off and trim. Trim the ostrich herl now as well.
- 9. Tie off behind the bead and whip finish and trim the tying thread.
