What Trout See with Jason Randall

As fly fishers, we often stalk our prey by sight fishing, and, if we're fortunate, we see fish and cast to them, hoping to entice them into eating what we want them to think is edible insects or bait fish. But far too often, we don't take into account what the fish are actually seeing when we present our flies. Many of us don't understand how our targeted prey use their sight and senses to notice our fly, then examine it and lastly, eat it. And how they do all this can greatly affect how successful we are.

We need to understand that fish do NOT see the way we do. Their eyes are different, how their two eyes work together (or not) is different and even WHERE fish actually are in the water is not necessarily where we "see" them to be. This is because "how" we see them is affected by the combination of light, air and water, with light refraction (the bending of light waves as they pass from one medium to another) playing a part in all this. What all this means is that to be really good fly fishers, we should understand how fish see, why they see the way they do and how this information should affect our strategy.

This month we are going to learn how and what trout see, and our teacher is definitely an accomplished, credible and friendly source – Jason Randall. Jason is a practicing veterinarian who lives in Woodstock, Illinois, where he and his wife, Jo, also a veterinarian, have an animal hospital. Jason explains one aspect of trout's unique survival mechanism this way: "Trout see directly in front with perfect focus, while at the same time, if we approach from the side, they can see us also with perfect clarity. That is because they have elliptically shaped eyes with multiple focal lengths. This would be like our reading a book we are holding in front of us, while at the same time we would have perfect eyesight and focus in our peripheral vision. Imagine how hard we'd be to sneak up on if that were the case, which is why trout are *extremely* difficult to surprise when we try to sneak up on them.

"Trout are visual predators – they select prey (and, we hope, our flies) based on visual clues. The more we understand their sense of sight and the criteria they use in prey selection, the more trout will end up in our nets."

Jason was born in Morris, Illinois, a small rural town in the north-central part of the state. His father introduced him to fishing, hunting and camping and his growing love of the outdoors led Jason to become an Eagle Scout when he was just 15.

He attended veterinary school at the University of Illinois, served in the Army and then moved to Woodstock to start his practice. He is not only a veterinarian, but a veterinarian certified in fish



health and medicine. He is also a member of the World Aquatic Veterinary Medical Association and the Society for Freshwater Science.

Jason picked up a fly rod in 1983, but with no guidance or instruction, became frustrated with fly fishing and casting and didn't handle a fly rod again for almost a decade. It was, during a Colorado vacation, that a friend suggested they go fly fishing. Fortunately they hired a guide who gave them casting instruction and solid, accurate advice. After these brief, though valuable lessons, Jason proceeded to catch several native trout and this experience, says Jason, hooked him on fly fishing for life. And "hook him" is an understatement.

Jason proceeded to not only study and learn fly fishing, achieving great success as thoroughly and quickly as few others have, but he also became adept at communicating the knowledge he gained. For the last twelve years, he has been an outdoor writer with feature articles appearing regularly in *American Angler*, *Fly Fisherman*, *Eastern Fly Fishing*, *Northwest Fly Fishing* and many other outdoor magazines.

During just the last several months, Jason has appeared and presented programs at fly fishing shows, conclaves and club week-ends throughout North America in places such as Somerset, New Jersey; Denver, Colorado; Detroit, Michigan; Philadelphia, Allenberry and Lancaster, Pennsylvania; Memphis, Tennessee; Edmonton, Alberta, Canada; and in other states as diverse as California, Texas, Ohio, Oklahoma, Nebraska, North Carolina, Arkansas and Illinois.

In 2012, Stackpole/Headwater books released Jason's first book, **Moving Water: A Fly Fisher's Guide to Currents**. This book studies and explains the effect of current on trout, their prey species and presentation, where vertical layers of current create drag and requires adjustments to improve nymph fishing success.

Jason's second book **Feeding Time: A Fly Fisher's Guide to What, Where and When Trout Eat**, was released in August of 2013. This valuable book focuses on matching your fishing strategies to the trout's feeding strategies, especially when targeting large trout.

And in 2014, the third book in his publisher's "Fly Fisher's Guide" trilogy was released -- **Trout Sense: A Fly Fisher's Guide to What Trout See, Hear and Smell**, which offers anglers an opportunity to know more about the quarry they seek.

Upcoming Outings

San Juan River - April 3 - 6, 2016

Spring is just around the corner and we are planning another fantastic outing to the San Juan River in New Mexico. The clear river waters of the San Juan are the jewel of Northwest New Mexico just a short 14 hour's drive from Southern California. The river is fed from the deep waters of Navajo Lake which provide nearly constant temperature and abundant food supplies. This means many large brown and rainbow trout with substantial fight.

Many of the club members have stayed at the Fisheads San Juan River Lodge [(505) 634-0463, <http://www.fisheadsofthesanjuan.com/>], and the Abe's Motel just across the street [(505) 632-2194, <http://sanjuanriver.com/>]. Both have very reasonable rates and can arrange guides as well. There are other accommodations as well. If making reservations at Fisheads, please let them know you are part of the FFCOC group. Contact Brian Mayer for full details.

This year, we are planning for fishing on the weekdays when all the kids have returned to school and we won't have to compete with the local weekend fishers. Plan to arrive on Sunday, April 3. If you arrive early enough, you may have the opportunity to wade fish the lower quality water. The general plan is to fish Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. These are the days that you should consider arranging guides. I strongly recommend you get a guide for at least two days to thoroughly enjoy all the fishing the San Juan Quality Water has to offer. Both Fisheads and Abe's offer package deals for two and three days guiding with lodging. Prices are the same as last year for guides and lodging. For those non-fishing travelers, there are several historic and interesting areas nearby to explore. The city of Aztec offers some shopping for Native American products and Durango, Colorado is a short drive away as well.

We have generally gathered as a group for dinner each night. Although there are limited choices in Navajo Dam, we usually go to the city of Aztec (short 20 minute drive) for dinners at the local Chinese restaurant and Mexican food restaurant.

The drive is approx. 8.5 hours from Ontario Airport. You will drive your own vehicle to the fishing locations and the return, usually within 1 hour of the fly shop, no 4 wheel drive necessary. Be at the fly shop at 8 a.m.

Tipping is considered normal, \$40-50 per day per person.

The picture (left) shows the kids in groups releasing the trout fry. Jim Wright explained to them the proper way to release them so they wouldn't go into shock. The kids said good bye to their little friends as they swam away.



At the Casting Station, Floyd, Rueben and John took a group of kids and demonstrated the science behind casting a rod. They then were able to try it themselves.



At the Fly Tying station, Lyman had his hands full. That is full of fly tying materials. He showed the students what we use and why we use certain materials. They were fascinated with the furs as Lyman passed pieces around for them to touch. They couldn't believe those materials went into those tiny little flies.

Fly Tying

Flies That Keep On Giving

Pyramid Lake in Nevada, WOW! We were guided by Rob Anderson and Chris Evison. And the stream keeper was Jim Wright who has much experience putting this trip together. He asked Rob to put together “flies the guides use” in a box for purchase by those interested. I only used one fly along with many others in the group. This fly was the **Copper Wino**. No, not a copper glass filled with wine but a copper bead and wine holographic tinsel. This fly is a quite simple fly to tie and very effective.

Copper Wino

Hook: Daiichi 1270 size 12
Bead: Copper 3/32 Brass or Tungsten
Thread: Black UTC 70
Wire: Copper Brown Extra Small
Body: Holographic Tinsel, Wine colored
Finish: Thin UV Cure



Place the bead on the hook small hole first and slide it to the eye. Place the hook in your vise. Start your thread behind the bead. Trap a piece of wire behind the bead and wrap over it down into the bend. Tie in a piece of holographic wine colored tinsel near the bend. Wrap the thread over the tinsel to the bead. Using overlapping wraps, wrap the tinsel forward to the bead, covering the previous thread wraps. Tie off and cut the extra tinsel. Spiral wrap the wire to the bead and tie off. Trim off the extra wire. Make several wraps of thread to secure the bead and taper from the body to the bead and whip finish. Smear a slight amount of UV fly finish over the body of the fly and set with a UV light.

This is a very effective fly on Pyramid and one to keep handy.
