If you've ever been there, then you know what I mean...By the time you read this, run-off should be in full swing and the fish should be spreading out from the five or six deep holes they have been hiding in all winter.

I did get a good look at "THE PIG" that lives at the Upper Bridge, he (or she, let's hope) was foul hooked by a gentleman fishing a 12 foot Tenkara rod. I tried to net the fish- all 34" of it, according to Kevin and thinking, "this net isn't going to be big enough..."

Now, I've had 20" trout in my net (unfortunately, not many of them) and was really sweating this one. But 'twas not to be, the hook pulled out, and "THE PIG" was back in the hole. Where it belongs.

Utah's Great Green River with Gordon Tharrett

Not too far from southern California is the trout-filled Green River, which flows from the bottom of the Flaming Gorge Dam near St. John, Utah. The Flaming Gorge Reservoir and "The Green" straddle the near-borders of Utah, Wyoming and Colorado. As this river slices out from the dam through the beautiful Uinta Mountain Range, digging out a stunning red rock canyon on its journey to join the Colorado River, it creates a fly fishing paradise known around the world as one of the truly premier trout streams. The population of rainbow, cutthroat and brown trout is estimated at between eight and 22,000 per mile, with the dam's release of steady-temperature water nurturing all of them. This consistently flowing cold, clear water and the associated plant life and abundance of insects are just a few of the reasons for a phenomenal growth rate of one to two inches *per month*.



Our guide on this amazing Green River adventure is Gordon Tharrett. Gordon started guiding for the legendary Denny Breer of *Trout Creek Flies* Fly Shop and Green River Outfitters back in the early 90s, planning to stay a couple years. He's been there ever since . . . and that beginning of his Green River guiding career was 24 years ago. But Gordon has guided in such diverse locations as New York, Tennessee, Idaho, Alaska, Canada, New Zealand, Chile and Argentina, so he is definitely an experienced fly fishing guide and not a "one-river" guide.

Gordon was born in upstate New York, the youngest of five siblings, and grew up just a five minute walk from the St. Regis River, where he started fly fishing with his grandfather. When he was 12-years-old on a fishing trip with his grandfather and an older brother to the Ausable River in Wilmington, NY, they stopped at the Adirondack Sport Shop that was owned by Fran Betters. There Gordon met Joan and Lee Wulff, who, to this day, are idols of his. Gordon has spent his life in our sport and loves all of it, but especially the Green.

So if you want to learn all about this great river, its abundant hatches, its three sections (Red Canyon -- seven miles long, Devil's Hole -- nine miles and Browns Park -- 12 miles), its stunning beauty and diversity, what tackle you should use and what are the best tactics for fishing this mecca of fly fishing, join Gordon at our June meeting and enjoy his informative presentation. A **\$200 Non-Refundable Deposit** is required to hold your spot, make checks payable to Circle Valley Anglers and send to John Williams 19859 Calle Cadiz Walnut, Ca. 91789

The drive is approx. 8.5 hours from Ontario Airport. You will drive your own vehicle to the fishing locations and the return, usually within 1 hour of the fly shop, no 4 wheel drive necessary. Be at the fly shop at 8 a.m.

Tipping is considered normal, \$40-50 per day per person.

Lodging & Food: Circle Valley Anglers has a house attached to the fly shop it rents for \$99 per night and sleeps 3. Very comfortable

Fishing Reports

COLORADO Trip Report May 1-7, 2016

Twelve eager club members participated in the Colorado Trip May 1 thru May 7. The organization and planning of this trip was a collaboration between Lyman Kennedy, Mark Spowart and Carl Thompson and was based on their prior adventures in this area. (For those who don't know, Mark and his family now live in Monument, Colorado.)

Sunday, May 1, was a travel day with most of the participants flying to Denver and checking into their lodging. About half of the participants moved into Mark Spowart's new house (very nice, indeed) and the rest into a nearby Marriott hotel. Mark and his wife, Liz, prepared great dinners at their house for the first three nights of the trip.

Monday and Tuesday we fished the South Platte River which is about an hour and half drive west from Monument. From there the river flows north east thru Denver, joins with the North Platte, flows to the Missouri, then into the Mississippi.

There are several dams on the headwaters of this river and the sections of the river between them are often referred to by unique names. The three we fished were Deckers, Dreamstream and Cheeseman Canyon. We divided into groups and fished different sections on Monday and Tuesday. Deckers and Dreamstream are each a modest walk from their parking area while Cheeseman Canyon is a mountainous hike of several miles, depending how far "in" you go.

We had some great guides on this part of the, names you might recognize, including Landon Mayer, John Keefavor, Pat Dorsey and Bob Dye.

The fishing was wade fishing in cool mountain water. The fish were taking small flies. We used three fly rigs with two or three small nymphs and midges. A lot of fish were caught including Rainbows, Browns and an occasional Sucker. See the photos for examples.

Wednesday we headed west about 190 miles to our second destination, the town of Gunnison and the Gunnison River. Gunnison is the home of Colorado Western University and has a small town vibe. We ate breakfast and dinner at the Old Miner Cafe - quite good! We stayed in cabins at the nearby Almont Resort. These cabins come in various sizes, are comfortable and served well for our purpose. The resort sits at the confluence of the East River and the Taylor River which forms the Gunnison River.

We fished the Gunnison River on Thursday and Friday. Our guides used drift boats to move us down the river. The river was carrying runoff from headwaters higher in the mountains and was brown in color, making it hard to see takes. This was even more evident on Friday. The typical set up was a small plastic egg with a Rubberlegs below and a BWO nymph below that. Fish I caught were mostly on the Rubberlegs. Fishing was good on Thursday but tough on Friday as the flow was increased. Never-

theless, we caught plenty of fish. My fishing partner, Evan Morgan, landed a real healthy 25 inch Rainbow!

Saturday we drove about 4 hours to the airport. We were treated with hail and snow on the way and delayed flights at the airport.



Overall a great trip!

Fly Tying

Flies That Keep On Giving

I have tied Sculpin patterns before but without the addition of the Fish Skull helmet, I have spooked many Sculpin while fishing and not had one with me. I plan to hit them with a small fly 1 3/4" long Sculpin which is the mini helmet head. I have seen much this size.

Hook:	Daiichi 1760 #8
Thread:	UTC 140 any color, it does not show.
Tail:	Pheasant Body Feathers
Body:	Blood Marabou Olive or Brown
Fins:	Pheasant Body Feathers
Collar:	Deer Hair Rust or Tan
Head:	Fish Skull Mini head
Cement:	Super Glue
Head coloring:	Felt tip marker Black



A rotary vice is very helpful to tie this fly. Place the hook in the vise and smear a slight amount of super glue on the shank. Start the thread at the eye and wrap to the bend, be careful not to over load behind the eye with too many wraps as the skull has to fit on this area in the end. Match two pheasant body feathers together facing the same way and tie them on to the shank to form one half of the tail, do the same on the other side leaving them the hook shank length to the rear, each side should face each other. Peel off of a blood marabou feather ten to fifteen barboles holding the tips and making sure they are aligned, tie them in by the tips and wrap forward to the mid way point of the shank. Match a pair of pheasant body feather together and tie in on either side of the marabou so the curve of the feather is toward the outside to form the fins. Cut a small bunch of deer hair and stack and tie on top of the hook just in front of the fins to form a collar. Rotate your vice and tie in another clump on the opposite side and whip finish. Leave your vice in this position the point of this fly is on the top. Super glue the head area again and slide the helmet on with the eye spots on top. Place a slight amount of super glue on the eye depressions and place them on with your bodkin. Apply color to the helmet with a marker to your liking. Rotate the vice and trim the bottom of the tail feather so it will ride flat on the bottom. These fish skitter on the bottom as this fly should.
